Ataraxia was founded in 2004. Husband and wife team, Kevin and Hanli, in partnership with a few friends, purchased 50 hectares of prime vineyard land. The landscape in which Ataraxia is situated, called The Skyfields is unique, lying as it does on the most elevated section of the Hemel-en-Aarde area. Nestled on this commanding rise beneath the soaring BabylonsToren mountain range, our vineyards are planted on some of the most spectacular terroirs South Africa has to offer. It is a place where wines of incredible finesse, balance and depth are crafted, that proudly hold their own in the international arena.

Kevin Grant completed a diploma in Cellar Technology at Elsenburg Agricultural, graduating as Dux Student in 1990. While working at top-end estates in South Africa, he undertook study/harvest trips to France, Oregon, Australia and New Zealand, including an extended period in which he was the winemaker who put South Africa's Hamilton-Russell on the map.

Trained initially as a biologist, Kevin has always been a winemaker who cares about the environment. As Lames Molesworth of Wine Spectator notes, Kevin "A South African biologist-turned-vintner starts off with three outstanding wines--still manages to keep an eye on the wildlife."

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Cederberg

South Africa's high altitude winery



South Africa's most uniquely situated wine farm falls within the pristine environs of the Cederberg Wilderness Area, which lies in the Cape Floral Kingdom. Here, among spectacular rock formations and fynbos, you will find the highest altitude vineyards in the Cape. Conservation is fundamental and Cederberg Private Cellar is a committed member of the Biodiversity & Wine Initiative.

The cold climate and remote location, with its pure mountain air and water, ensures that the vines are virus free. This results in award-winning wines which show an exceptional purity of fruit. The farm has been in the Nieuwoudt family for five generations and David Nieuwoudt currently makes the wines.

In October 2005 David was invited to become a member of the Cape Winemakers Guild, the 37th member since the Guild's inception in 1982. What a rare honour this is for a winemaker fighting the odds three hours north of South Africa's wine hub! Since then Cederberg wines have twice been named best in South Africa by Decanter, and have been awarded multiple 90+ ratings.

As impressive as the quality, is the commitment to take care of the rare and pristine environment which surrounds the winery, the Cederberg Wilderness. It is part of the Cederberg Conservancy an agreement between landowners and the government to manage the environment in a sustainable manner through environmental management plans, ecological auditing, co-operation and dedication to the conservation of nature on private land.

The Cederberg lies 250 km north of Cape Town. This vast region encompasses approximately 162,000 ha of mountainous terrain, stretching from the Pakhuis Pass in the north, to Grootrivier in the south, towards Ceres.

Uiterwyk (pronounced ate-er-wick) literally means last outpost. The famous estate at the end of the main road from Cape Town to Stellenbosch has been known as one of the best places to grow fruit for for more than 250 years. It has been a De Waal family operation for that entire time.

Among other ways this family has been a leader in South Africa's wine industry is their commercial pioneering of the Pinotage grape. Today, the Top of the Hill lot is home to the oldest Pinotage vines in the world, and on very special vintages, produces arguably the best Pinotage in the world.

Pieter and his brothers Daniel and Chris have made their priority creating wines of outstanding value while caring for the environment.

Among the many accolades attesting to results produced by the 8th generation of the DeWaal family is being named by Decanter Magazine as "One of the Ten best varietal producers in South Africa."



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De Wetshof

Dani De Wet, South Africa's "King of Chardonnay" has made producing world-class Chardonnay his life's work.



Proprietor and winemaker, Danie de Wet's love of wine emanates from the time he was a young boy following his father around the farm in the Robertson Valley. The De Wet ancestors arrived at the Cape in 1694 and the family has been involved in the wine industry ever since.

De Wetshof Estate has over the past two decades become renowned in the Cape for its innovative and advanced use of technology in helping to produce both better grapes and create great wines. This passion and careful planning have helped make De Wetshof the premier Chardonnay house in South Africa.

This emphasis on Chardonnay dates back to Danie's days as a student at the Geisenheim Institute in Germany, where he studied viticultural and oenological. While there he tasted many fine examples of this variety, as well as undertaking visits to leading Burgundian wineries. Today he has his own vineyard specific Chardonnays offering widely differing styles.

The iconic Limestone Hill Chardonnay has been hailed by Wine Advocate as "having better balance and drinkability than 99% of the world's Chardonnays I've tasted at this price." and the Bataleur is one of South Africa's most awarded wines, including the Prestige Trophy at Les Citadelles du Vin.

The family also is a champion of the environment, and has built, equipped, and staffed a state-of-the-art creche (kindergarden) on the estate for the workers' children since the 1980;s.

Doolhof means Labyrinth. Multiple microclimates give the wines complexity and depth.



The name Doolhof means “labyrinth.” Set in the many nooks and crannies of Bovlei Valley northeast of Wellington, Doolhof Estate has been the jewel of the valley for three centuries.

Today, this labyrinthine topography is harmonized with the positioning of our vineyards, making good use of the many micro-climates and terroirs which are ultimately expressed in the Doolhof Estate wines.

In such a setting, it is no surprise that Doolhof farm is a member of the Biodiversity and Wine Initiative, a ground-breaking partnership between the South African wine industry and the conservation sector that aims to preserve the biodiversity of the Cape Floral Kingdom.

All of the wines showcase the complexity and layered flavors hewn from this unique terroir, particularly their reds with the multi Double Gold medal winning Minotaur, back-to-back Decanter World Wine winning Merlot, the beguiling Dark Lady of the Labyrinth, and complex Lady in Red. In a tribute to making wine in harmony with nature, the Cape series features wines described by Wine Enthusiast as “stylish, poised and elegant.”

Modern classics with a new world freshness added to traditional structures.



The Dornier family has a proud heritage of innovation, creativity, and perfection, and they bring that to the wines that carry their name. Their philosophy reads, “We are led by the principles of tradition and inspired by perfection; yet realize the power of innovation. Everything that Dornier stands for and embodies - be it the place or the wines - creatively fuse the opposites of change and stasis, seriousness and pleasure, complexity and simplicity. We embrace difference where it leads to improvement, and still recognize the value of what has come before.”

With that heritage and driving philosophy, the Dornier family found the perfect place to make wines of unbending quality and innovative creativity. The “Golden Triangle” of Stellenbosch is home to some of the most revered wines in the world, and the complex soils are vital in giving the wines their unique character, as is the range in altitude of the vineyards - from 100 and 200 metres above sea level. A multitude of aspects add to vineyard diversity and the high mountain peaks trap the cool Atlantic breezes to slow the ripening and create intense flavor compounds.

In the US, their wines have already received multiple 90+ ratings, “Best Buy” accolades, and inclusion in the NYTimes Wine Club. From the value-driven second label, Cocoa Hill, to the striking Donatus pair, Dornier certainly delivers modern classics that are making their mark.

Natural Wines – spontaneous, wild fermentation, no filtering, no fining.



Meyer Joubert is a 7th generation French Huguenot immigrant to South Africa (3rd generation at the Joubert-Traudauw Private Cellar); part of a family that has been involved in winemaking almost since its inception there. Perhaps it is due to this long historical family connection that Meyer is so compelled to make wines they way they were made hundreds of years ago.

It is a minimalist approach that begins by allowing spontaneous, wild fermentation from the yeasts that naturally occur on the grapes. It continues with no fining, no filtering, and only previously used oak barrels for aging.

The result is “natural wines” that are, as described in Wine Enthusiast Magazine, “complex, balanced, and delicious.” Producing small quantities of handcrafted wines made in conjunction with nature is Meyer’s passion.

A viticulturist by trade, having grown up on the wine farm, Meyer appreciates the great wine that nature can make if man just assists in a non-invasive manner.

The line of wines is also minimal, with a Syrah and Chardonnay, both made in the very traditional French style, yet expressing the terroir of the Klein Karoo and the uniqueness of each individual vintage.

Natural farming, highest quality fruit and minimal interference in the cellar.



Legend has it that the name Lammershoek, meaning "lamb's corner", originated from the fact that ewes with their young lambs sought shelter in the forests surrounding the farm, when threatened by the black eagle. Lammershoek was founded in 1718. The first vineyards were planted in 1750.

The focus is on grapes that can perform on sandy, mineral-rich decomposed granitic soils where water is scarce and the sun is hot. This means they primarily grow Rhone varietals. Lammershoek has 96ha of vineyards ranging from our beautiful bush-vine, dry-land, 50+ year Chenin Blanc to Syrah staked in the Northern Rhone style to old, "unconventional" specialities such as Carignan, Harslévelü and Tinta Barocca.

Lammershoek makes wine with minimal intervention. No herbicides nor pesticides have been used for years. No irrigation is used. No additives (apart from the minimal use of SO₂), no new wood and no pumps were used. Some 6000 litres are pressed by foot alone. Fermentation relied completely on indigenous yeasts and any extraction was kept to a minimum.

For those who want to experience the terroir in a wine, Lammershoek delivers the beauty and depth of the Swartland like no others. No wonder Parker calls Lammershoek "one of South Africa's top producers."

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Morgenster

Partnership with Pierre Lurton strives to make the best Bordeaux blends in the New World.



Morgenster Estate in the Western Cape, just 35 minutes outside of Cape Town, specializes in three Bordeaux red wine cultivars and our forte is blending. Director & Wine Consultant Pierre Lurton (a name synonymous with Bordeaux) works in tandem with resident Winemaker Henry Kotzé and the viticulture team, Bob Hobson and François Viljoen, to offer to Morgenster's customers the ultimate best in a red blend.

The 300-year-old wine estate was once part of the thriving farm, Vergelegen. The section now known as Morgenster was bought by Jacques Malan, a Huguenot who had fled religious persecution in France and was to found a dynasty in the Cape. It was he who gave the farm its name.

Giulio Bertrand, who bought the farm in 1992, immediately set about the work of creating the best Bordeaux-style wines in the New World, a goal that continues today.

The two wines are the Morgenster and the Lourens River Valley. The Morgenster is a classic left bank of Bordeaux Cabernet Sauvignon-dominant wine of great power and structure, and one Stephen Tanzer has called "one of South Africa's top bottlings." The Lourens River Valley, a second label if you will, is a Merlot-dominant right bank style blend that is elegant, sophisticated supple, and "awfully good for a second wine," according to Tanzer.

One of the oldest wine estates in the world and a Simonsberg classic.



In 1659, the first grapes were pressed in South Africa. A few years later, in 1685, Lourens Campher was granted a piece of land to farm at the foot of the Simonsberg Mountain in Stellenbosch. 325 years later, the oak trees he planted and home he built still stand on this grand old wine estate.

“Nowhere else in this beautiful wineland of ours are you so strongly reminded that the history of wine here is as old as South Africa itself. Here you can once again become aware that the art of wine-making arose on those pieces of earth where people with an exceptional joy in life had settled.” - Maureen Joubert

The Simonsberg Ward of Stellenbosch is akin to the Rutherford appellation in Napa; arguably the best of the best. From this spectacular terroir, and with great honor paid to the history of the place, the Melck family make distinctive wines for the connoisseur.

Intensely dedicated to living and farming in ways respectful of nature and their fellow citizens, Muratie Estate has set up a trust for education, training, and management programs for the estate workers and their families. They also use natural pesticides ranging from wasps to ducks and even wild lynx, and are part of the Biodiversity Wine Initiative.

In their first year in the US, Muratie wines have received multiple 90+ ratings, as well as an Editor’s Choice and Cellar Selection designations.

"A place of rare beauty where man and nature strive together to produce great wines."



Neethlingshof's vine roots stretch back to the earliest years of winemaking at the Cape - grapes were already being produced on the farm by 1705. Despite being steeped in history it has also remained in the forefront of new trends and developments, and has become a leading exponent of the drive to balance nature and winegrowing in the Western Cape.

As a consequence its select range of wines is a telling reflection of what is uniquely Neethlingshof. The Neethlingshof estate lies just outside the town of Stellenbosch in the heart of the Cape Winelands. Eight clearly distinguishable terroirs, each characterized by unique slopes, aspects and altitudes, have been identified. By choosing the correct location, it has been possible to enhance the natural flavor and aroma of all the cultivars selected for planting.

There is also a renewed emphasis on elegance created through its eco-sustainable farming practices. The reds are now more subtly oaked, showing softer tannins and greater harmony, while the whites exhibit a purer expression of fruit. Phenolic ripeness is being achieved at lower sugar levels through appropriate vineyard-row orientation and canopy management, while winemaker De Wet Viljoen has adopted a regime of gentler handling of fruit and is increasingly making use of Hungarian and other Eastern European oak to create a softer, more accessible profile.

Since planting the first vineyards in 2004, the Partnership Vineyards project has grown from a dream and a few vines planted in the promising soil of the farm Highlands, to the reality of a commercial farm cultivating wine grapes.

The concept of Partnership Vineyards was born and today 151 previously disadvantaged people from the Riebeeck Valley are partners in the farm which will not only pay them dividends the moment the project becomes profitable, but will also give them ownership of land and their piece of Africa. Shares in Partnership Vineyards can be bequeathed but cannot be sold.

The farm has realized the dreams and longings of many of the people living and working in the Riebeeck Valley and surrounds.

However, everyone involved knows their success is dependent on creating wines of high quality and value. Research shows consumers will select and be more loyal to Fairtrade products, if the quality and price are equal to non-Fairtrade products.

In its first vintage in the US, the wines are showing their quality by being selected as a “Best Buy” in Wine & Spirits Magazine, and winning multiple medals at US and international competitions.

With a quality product and the inspiring social and environmental change generated by Partnership’s Fairtrade programs, it is no wonder partnership sales in the US are skyrocketing in a short period of time.

Rooiberg winery is one of the most popular brands in South Africa, known and loved for their approachable, yet high quality wines offered at reasonable, everyday prices. The wines have been recognized as “Great Value” more than 20 times by Wine Magazine in the last three years.

In the US, they’ve been met with multiple “Best Buy” recommendations from Wine and Spirits Magazine, and have been called “Outstanding wine bargains” in Robert Parker’s Wine Advocate.

But these are not just simple sipping wines; there is balance, complexity, structure, and firm acidity that makes them enjoyable on their own or as a great pairing to many different foods.

As good as you’ll feel about the quality and value in the bottle, you can also feel good about how the wines are made. They are certified organic by Eurpoe’s main organic certifying body, SGS, and operate as a co-op of indenepdent grape growers, many of which are multi-generation family operations.

Baron Edmond Rothschild and Dr. Anton Rupert were renowned wine producers in their native countries of France and South Africa, as well as being long time friends, when in 1997, they decided to enter into a partnership to create world-class wines from one of South Africa's great estates.

It is a true partnership, with viticulturists and winemakers from France and South Africa spending part of the year in the other location, working together and sharing experiences. It is the ultimate blending of old world and new world winemaking.

They focus on just three wines. The flagship Baron Edmond is a powerful, yet sophisticated wine of immense stature. The Baroness Nadine is an elegant barrel fermented Chardonnay. The Classique is a classic Bordeaux blend that, while accessible in youth, will gracefully age within the bottle.

In addition to the Rupert and Rothschild families striving to produce world-class wine, they are deeply committed to the preservation and conservation of the environment. This resulted in Rupert & Rothschild Vignerons being the first winery in South Africa to be awarded the ISO 14001 Environmental Management Certification. Benefits include environmental sustainability in operations, but also a safer working environment.

Solms-Delta is much more than a wine estate. Located 15km outside the village of Franschhoek in the heart of the Cape Winelands, the magnificent wine estate produces classical wines with a difference... In fact everything about Solms-Delta is different.

The South African roots of world-renowned neuroscientist Professor Mark Solms brought him back home in 2002 to revitalize the historic Delta wine estate ... and to fundamentally rethink Cape wine-making traditions in the process.

Solms assumed custodianship of the 320-year-old estate with a vision that went much deeper than re-establishing its vineyards and cellars. He also wanted to do something about the legacy of his European forebears (who had settled in the Cape six generations before) and thereby address the pressing social and economic problems facing South Africa today.

Solms is not only changing how blacks and whites work and live together in South Africa, but is changing perceptions of what South African wine can be. Solms wines offer a cascade of tastes and styles that have inspired comments such as: “This wine just blew my skull off,” “unorthodox,” “delectably intense,” “a breath of fresh air,” “as uplifting as rain on dusty hot earth,” “a cheeky pat on the bottom,” as well as questions like “how to rate a cultural weapon?”

No wonder it is among the “100 Most Exciting Wine Finds.”

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Vrede en Lust “Peace and Eagerness”



Vrede en Lust was established by the French Huguenot, Jacques de Savoye in 1688. De Savoye immediately started improving the 60 morgen (55 Ha) of land that starts on the Berg River Valley floor and runs up the eastern foothills of the majestic Simonsberg mountain. More than 10,000 vines were planted by 1691, which grew to 80,000 by 1780.

The Buys family purchased this wine farm in 1996, and set up restoring a number of the historic buildings and replanting the farm to noble wine grape cultivars. In 1998 Dana entered into a partnership with his brother Etienne, who has since overseen the vineyards and building of the winery. The new winery was completed in time for the 2002 harvest.

Vrede en Lust also source grapes from family owned vineyards in the cooler Elgin region, adding cooler-climate flavors to their white wines in particular.

The winemaking team is led by Woman Winemaker of the Year, Susan Erasmus. The winemaking philosophy is simple – to make wines of the highest quality, honest wines that reflect their terroir with minimal intervention in the cellar. The wines are clearly new world in style – some more classical and some with a modern twist – this lineup shows the diversity of the vineyards and the careful handling of the winemaking process.

The quality of these wines shows forth in the flagship Boet Erasmus Bordeaux blend, which just received a 95 rating, Gold Medal, and Trophy as the best red wine in South Africa at the prestigious International Wine Challenge.
